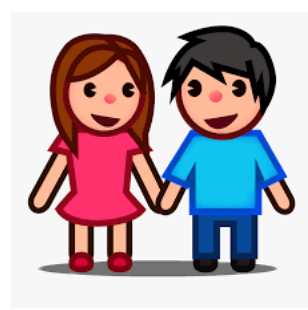

Draw around your child on a large piece of paper. Rolls of lining paper are ideal when working on a big scale. Then let your little one loose with paints to fill in the shape. Anything goes – from stripes as in the picture on the left, to printing, to complete freestyle!

Experiment with different poses, too, to make some dynamic, vibrant paintings.





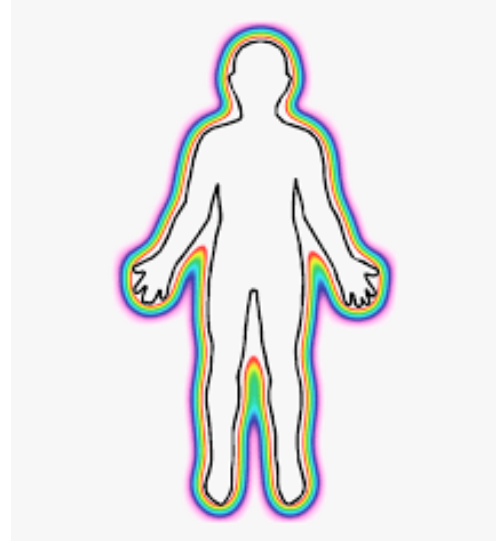
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Silhouette Shapes

You could draw around your child and then they can practise following around the outside of the silhouette with crayons or paint.



Halo Hands



The above idea can also look really effective around your child's hand. Keep the hand pattern-free and build up around the shape of the hand. It doesn't have to be neat – it's more about your child focusing on the line and practising their fine motor skills.

And a really novel idea is to draw around your child on the floor or patio in chalk and let them follow along the shape with socks! They work because they can be easily moulded along the lines!
